

Marriages: Marriages are celebrated in the Church where the bride or groom is registered at. When a man and a woman plan to marry each other, they should contact a priest one year in advance and always before the wedding date is set, and before arranging for the reception hall. The engaged are required to attend a Marriage Preparation Course.

Please note: However, if this man or woman has previously gone through any form of civil or religious marriage with another person, the priest is not permitted to set a date for the wedding until the Bishop's office has been consulted. Questions are often being asked about marriages performed outside the Catholic Church by non-Catholic ministers. These are not valid marriages according to the teaching of the Catholic Church, but many can be rectified by simply consulting with your Parish priest to discuss the available options. Sometimes people make decisions without proper information, so if you wish, please contact your Pastor for details or call the Marriage Tribunal at 416-934-3400 ext 300.

SEASON OF ADVENT

Advent has a twofold nature: It prepares us for Christmas, when we recall Christ's first coming among us, and it is also a time when we look forward to his second coming at the end of the ages. Advent is a season of joyful expectation.

During Advent, each Sunday's Gospel reading has a specific focus. The Old Testament readings, especially those taken from Isaiah, are prophecies about the Messiah and messianic times. The selections from the writings of the Apostles present exhortations and instructions on different themes of the season.

EXAMINATION OF CONSCIENCE FOR ADVENT

Do I accept responsibility for my own sins? Have I tried to hide from God, afraid and ashamed? Do I pray regularly, trusting that God will be merciful? Do I tend to blame others or look for scapegoats when things go wrong? Do I gossip about others?

Do I accept God's plan, trusting in the mystery of Divine love and ready to do God's will? Am I suspicious of or even angry at God? Does anger keep me from praying or participating fully in the life of the Church? As I consider my own death or the deaths of my loved ones, do I trust in the promises God has made? Do I encourage others to believe in the life that is to come?

Am I willing to face God and accept the call to be a disciple of Jesus? Have I attended Mass on Sunday? Do I give regular financial support to the Church? Do I love my neighbour as myself, in my actions as well as my words? Have I supported justice for all people, especially the poor?

Do I appreciate the gifts other people have, or do I envy their relationships and possessions? Have I lied or avoided telling the truth when it was unpopular? Have I taken anything that did not belong to me? Have I met my financial obligations to family and those dependent on me?

Am I willing to follow Christ even when I will have to suffer for it? Do I admit that I am a Christian even when I know it is unpopular? Have I rejected God's will for me, especially as it relates to my sexuality? Do I care for my own body, for the goods of the earth, for the resources I have to live on?

Father is available for confession before Mass or by appointment.

THE ADVENT WREATH

The Advent wreath is like a prayer to God our Father: Please open our eyes. Turn us toward You. Help us to welcome Your son, the Light of the World.

Why do we use candles? The candles remind us of the one for whom we are waiting, Jesus, the Light of the World. In the first week of Advent we light only one candle, in the second week two, and so on, until all four are shining brightly. In this same way, as we prepare to welcome Jesus at Christmas, the light of his love is growing in us.

Why do we use evergreens? These branches remain always fresh and green, even during the darkest days of winter. They remind us that the light of Jesus' love brings a peace and joy which lives in us every day and will never end.

Why do we use the colours of purple and pink? Purple is a serious colour. It reminds us that preparing to welcome Jesus is serious work. Pink is the colour of joy. We light this candle on the third Sunday of Advent to remind us that, if we are preparing well to welcome Jesus at Christmas, great joy will soon be ours.

Set the Wreath in a place of honour such as the centre of a dining table. Gather around the wreath on each Sunday of Advent. Say a simple prayer as you light the candles.

HOLLY, IVY AND MISTLETOE

These three plants are commonly associated with Christmas.

Holly has been used for hundreds of years to make wreaths that were hung on the doors of homes and in churches. Among some people, it was believed that holly had magical powers, for it was said to be able to keep witches away. But even more important is the fact that it was always seen as a reminder of the crown of thorns that Jesus wore when He was crucified. It is said that the red berries represent drops of blood that fell from Jesus' head.

Ivy has both a good and a bad meaning. For some, it was a sign of the pagan religions (for it is often made into crowns that were placed on the statues of pagan gods.) The holly and the ivy were opposed (Christianity and paganism), and the holly won. Yet some speak of the white berries of the ivy as being a sign of purity and innocence.

Mistletoe had been used by the Celtic Druids (pagan priests) even before Christians arrived. They considered it to be sacred and used it in their ceremonies. So it was forbidden to use it in Christian churches. Yet it was often used in homes, for it was a charm to bring on marriage. To this day, there is a custom that one can kiss a person who is standing under a sprig of mistletoe.
